| President's Report     | Dr. Neupauer reported on the following:<br><u>State and Federal Activities</u><br>-We are carefully monitoring the Governor's plan for higher education. He<br>believes higher education model in PA needs work. Community colleges have<br>local sponsors and boards appointed by County Commissioners. This makes<br>community colleges a sector. The PA State System of Higher Education<br>institutions function under a board of governors and a chancellor. This makes<br>PASSHE schools a system. One option for the Governor's plan is that<br>community colleges will answer to a statewide board and a local advisory board.<br>On December 22, the Governor met with community college and PASSHE<br>presidents. Another opportunity to learn more about the Governor's plan is<br>scheduled for January 18 and his "State of the State" address on February 6. |

She read the following statement:</li> <li>As you are aware, President Neupauer has shared his intention to retire as the eighth President of Butler County Community College effective December 31, 2024. That message was shared both internally and externally on January 9.</li> <li>President Neupauer, along with Tina Fleeger, BC3's Executive Director of Human Resources/Equal Opportunity Compliance Officer, have been working with the Board for close to a year to ensure a smooth Presidential transition. Our Board's Quality Assessment Committee looked at succession planning four years ago. That work, along with additional Presidential transition models, have been and continue to be examined by our Board.</li> </ul> |
|                  | It's been quite some time since BC3 has needed to implement a succession/transition plan for the position of President. Dr. Neupauer's tenure of close to 17 years is well beyond the 5.9 year-average of college or university Presidents, according to a 2023 survey conducted by the American Council of Education.  |
|                  | <ul> <li>Each of us around this table is honored to serve as a member of the BC3 Board of Trustees. Our three overarching responsibilities as members of the Board are:</li> <li>a. Fiduciary;</li> <li>b. Policy-making; and</li> <li>c. Hiring and working with a President, who has the authority of internal management of this institution.</li> </ul>   |

To our students, faculty, staff and the communities we serve: as a Board, we pledge to ensure a smooth transition and maintain excellence in our top-ranked institution of higher education moving forward. The College will continue to pursue its mission and strategic plan.

President Neupauer's long, successful tenure – recognized locally, at the state and national levels – is something that as a Board we believe can help a new President.

To this end, the Board is honored to offer a six-month paid sabbatical for Dr. Neupauer from July 1, 2024, to December 31, 2024. This sabbatical is in lieu of any paid leave time Dr. Neupauer has accumulated in his long tenure at the College.

A sabbatical is defined as "a break from work." After close to 17 years as President, our Board understands the need for Dr. Neupauer to separate from the demands of serving as President. Yet, we also value his role to serve as a resource for a new President, for which Dr. Neupauer has enthusiastically agreed to do during this six-month period.

As a Board, we understand the significance of our College's finances. The aforementioned model will generate a cost savings. This information will be shared at a later time ... as will the plan for our Presidential transition.

The Board will provide an update on the plan to replace President Neupauer at the March 20, 2024, Board meeting.

## Motion-Presidential Executive Employment Agreement Sabbatical and Retirement

Ms. Pullar moved to approve the offer of a six-month paid sabbatical for Dr. Nicholas C. Neupauer as President of Butler County Community College from July 1, 2024, through December 31, 2024, at which time Dr. Neupauer will retire as the eighth President of Butler County Community College.
