After a two-year pause with regard to COVID-19, the program that blends classroom learning with real-world experience has attracted its largest number of students seeking free, transferrable credits to Butler County Community College

Debuted in 2018

he program for seniors at Riverside and Lincoln high schools launched in 2018 through a partnership among BC3, CCBC, the Ellwood City Area Chamber of Commerce and Ellwood City area businesses.

Fifteen high school seniors since 2019 have graduated from the Riv-Ell Entrepreneurship Program, said Erin Cioffi, BC3's assistant director of high school programming.

Ten students in 2022-2023 are taking college courses taught by BC3 and CCBC instructors at Lincoln High or online, gaining insight through field trips to Ellwood City area businesses such as the Ellwood City Forge and preparing to create a program-ending business plan.

"The Riv-Ell program provides students with an opportunity to see if business is right for them," Cioffi said, "and an opportunity to meet and explore local leaders and their businesses."

Donors benefit program

Inancial contributions from 15 businesses, nonprofit organizations, BC3 administrators and other individuals fund tuition, fees and books for Riv-Ell students to earn the 16 tuition-free credits and a BC3 Workplace Certificate in Entrepreneurship, which represents a work-ready, post-secondary academic achievement.

Mars High student seeks 30 BC3 credits

BC3 offers 60 courses in 6 counties



Mars Area High senior is working to earn 30 transferrable Butler County Community College credits by May from a BC3 program offering re-

duced-cost courses at high schools or learning centers in six western Pennsylvania counties.

Carson Gerthoffer is pursuing nine transferrable credits this fall through BC3's College Within the High School program and intends to complete six next spring. The Mars High computer club member earned 15 transferrable BC3 credits in his junior year at Mars.

Earning 30 credits through BC3's College Within the High School program would be "just incredible," said Gerthoffer, who is seeking a career in cybersecurity.

The BC3 Education Foundation has awarded **a record \$280,000** in scholarships to BC3 students in 2022-2023.

credits in store for my future," Gerthoffer said. "And I can use them in college and I can use the money that I saved for college even later."

BC3's College Within the High School program enters its 24th year this fall, when it is offering 60 reduced-cost courses to qualified sophomores through seniors at 15 high schools and learning centers in Butler, Clarion, Clearfield, Jefferson, Lawrence and Mercer counties.

400-plus enrolled again

uition and fees this fall for a three-credit BC3 College Within the High School program course range from \$405 to \$429, depending on the county in which the high school is located.

"Affordability is important because you can spend that money on so many other things," Gerthoffer said. "You can save money. Invest it. Buy a house or a car. It's just better to save money."

BC3's program this fall enrolls more than 400 students for the seventh consecutive semester, according to Erin Cioffi, the college's assistant director of high school programming.

"Not only does it allow students to have access to college credits at a much more affordable price, but it is also a program that prepares students to go to college," said Corey Goeggelman, a Mars High teacher who has been instructing BC3's American national government course for three years. **"Deeper understanding"** hey get to understand what a college workload is going to be like. Once they are in college, they can skip some of those prerequisite courses. They don't have to take some of those general education requirements when they get there."

BC3 courses in American national government, business leadership and speech being taken by Gerthoffer are among others such as elementary statistics, general psychology and marketing being taught to Mars High students this fall.

"I think our students are really interested in getting a deeper understanding of these topics," said Goeggelman, who himself has 19 juniors and seniors in BC3's American national government course that he teaches five mornings a week.

"There's a lot of interest in learning."

"Super cost-efficient" erthoffer completed BC3 College Within the High School courses in marketing and in microeconomics in the fall of his junior year at Mars High.

He finished business math, general psychology and productivity applications in the spring of his junior year.

Gerthoffer intends to pursue courses in business law and in introduction to entrepreneurship in the spring.

"The fact that he may manage to get so many credits through College Within the High School, that is going to be super cost-efficient for him," said American national government classmate Avery See Offers, Page 6





Forges! From Page 2 Final products can weigh up to 70,000 pounds. Every position on the floor, Book said, is "technical."

Classes and field trips

You have to have reasoning, math and language skills," Book said. "If you make a mistake on one of those pieces because you can't read a measuring tape or you can't read a 3D geometric drawing that you studied in ninth grade in geometry, or if you can't spatially look at a part or do trigonometry to figure out an angle or a reference, one of those blocks was \$50,000, \$60,000 because you didn't measure it correctly."

Riv-Ell students in 2022-2023 will take courses in introduction to entrepreneurship, the business plan, speech, marketing, financial literacy and general psychology, and field trips that include those to the Ellwood City Forge, Nalco Water and McElwain Brothers Paint and

Collision Center.

The program's field trip to the Ellwood City Forge introduced her to "different aspects of different jobs," said Hannah Mosholder, a Lincoln student who plans to one day establish a business.

"There is a lot that can go into one job that you may not realize," Mosholder said. "In other businesses, there is the manager and the associates. Here they have the same types of roles, but just in different ways. I found that to be very interesting."

Topics in introduction to entrepreneurship include entrepreneurial behavior, opportunity recognition, types of business ownership, financial and market research, and product development.

Marketing introduces the students to product, price, place and promotion.

"Super-interesting"

he business plan guides students

through the component parts of a business plan and prepares students to pursue avenues of funding for the new venture.

"I really do find the whole process of owning a business and starting a business to be super-interesting," said Paige Wearing, a Lincoln student. "I think it's important for us to know these types of things. Even if you don't want to do it right now, later in life you may want to start a business. And it's good to know the process."

Riv-Ell students who earned BC3's Workplace Certificate in Entrepreneurship at 17 years of age were the youngest graduates in BC3's Classes of 2019 and 2020.

"I know some people who have taken enough College Within the High School credits to chop down a semester and maybe even graduate from college a semester early, but that is even more than that."

"It's pretty in-depth"

Beller is a senior who is seeking a career in criminology and has taken business law, general psychology and speech at Mars High through BC3's College Within the High School program.

"It's a good deal," Beller said. "It's nice to be able to just walk to second period and know you are doing something to further your future."

American national government is the first BC3 College Within the High School course to be taken by Mars High hockey player Declan Abbey.

"It's pretty in-depth," said Abbey, a junior seeking a career as an engineer.

"It definitely gets into the nitty-gritty of government and keeps you engaged. And you don't have to leave your high school. It just fits right in with your other classes and the rest of your day. It's obviously more convenient than having to leave and go somewhere else."

Added Gerthoffer: "You don't have to go anywhere else. Everything is set up for you. And it will help you later on down the line."
